

Guidance to paying tuition fees for International students

- A case of voice phishing involvement occurred in the process of paying tuition fees by using illegal money changers* without using banks in their home country to save currency fees.
* Provide your account number, Hansei University virtual account number (tuition account), or Korean Language Institute tuition deposit account to illegal money changers.
- Guidance is needed to prevent damage to foreign students from voice phishing.

Points to Note

- (Do not use illegal money changer) If an account number is provided to an illegal money changer and the money changer pays the tuition fee, the provided account number may be used as a bank account linked to a voice phishing incident.
- (Transmission and collection through interbank exchange) International students residing abroad are transferred from the bank of their country of residence to a Korean domestic account under the student's name and paid tuition in the bill.

※ Cases of damage caused by illegal exchange dealer

[Step 1] Recruitment of international students to exchange money (WeChat)	(Illegal exchange dealer)
[Step 2] International student contacts a person who illegal exchange dealer (fake currency exchange dealer)	(Student or acquaintance)
[Step 3] A money changer asks for a remittance account number.	(Illegal exchange dealer)
[Step 4] Information on account number and remittance of exchange amount (WeChat Pay)	(Student or acquaintance)
[Step 5] Deposit the exchange amount into the student account (or tuition virtual account) without deposit or illegal funds.	(Illegal exchange dealer)
[Step 6] After voice phishing is detected, the bank suspends payment of student and school accounts.	(Students themselves and schools)

— <Expected damage if involved in illegal money transactions and voice phishing, etc.> —

- If tuition is deposited into the school's 'Virtual account number (degree course tuition account) or Korean Language Institute tuition account' with illegal funds, the bank account is determined as a 'criminal account' under Korean law, causing damage to school work, and the student may suffer damage by paying additional tuition fees due to the reason for not being able to process tuition deposit.
- If the student is deposited into a domestic bank account with illegal funds, the student may be subject to criminal punishment under Korean laws and may cause damage that restricts the student's own domestic bank financial transactions.
